Commodore's Corner: October

Ready or not it's October! That means a busy time for SSSS activities. There are races the first three weekends of the month, and the legendary Halloween Cruise at Long Branch on the last weekend. The New Member Social is mid month. The first weekend I am really conflicted: The Oysterfest Cruise in Shelton sounds like a blast, but there is also a race. Maybe I will race, and then take the crew to Shelton!

If you have not been to Shelton it is a must-do for south sound boating. For years I just never got around to the six plus mile gauntlet called Hammersley Inlet. There was always a reason not to go, either the tide was presumed wrong, there was a threat of fog, or there were just too many attractive distractions on the way. When we finally got there it was very rewarding, a bit thrilling, and a local cruise that we are looking forward to doing again. I felt better about my procrastination when I read Jo Bailey's comment in *Gunkholing in South Puget Sound* that she had boated out of Olympia for 18 years before she ventured to Shelton.

Osa's first trip down Hammersley Inlet was mid- way up on a spring tide. I figured if the water was initially a bit thin to pass, soon there would be plenty of water that would have us floating again. What I had not quite appreciated was that the rapid inflow of water also translates as current! As we meandered past Hope Island and entered the somewhat narrow entrance to Hammersley, I was calmly at the helm studying the chart plotter and Sabra was similarly studying the paper chart with a pencil at the ready to point out an anticipated route. This system worked great although the term meander shortly became a bit of an understatement; plummet down the inlet is perhaps more descriptive.

As we rounded the first bend after entering the inlet it was apparent that our casual trip had about a 3.5 knot assist! Confined places are a lot more interesting at 9.5 knots compared with

RC Report

Thanks to everyone who signed up at the September Meeting for Race Committee duty. If you haven't already signed up for the race committee duty, please come to the October Meeting and do so. Or you can contact me directly at rchair@ssssclub.com. After the Meeting I will begin assigning the races to those who have paid race fees but have not taken a slot. To see which dates are already taken, see the RC duty list

on the web site under the PHRF Race office.

We manage to keep the cost of racing low by having everyone who races also taking a turn as Race Committee boat. The secret to running a good race is in the preparation and there are detailed instructions in the PHRF section of the Handbook. If you are still nervous you can always go out with an experienced skipper on RC duty before running your own race. It really can be a fun and rewarding experience. The web site and the RC boat clipboard both contain a RC Boat crib sheet which is a quick reference guide for organizing and running the race. The sheet includes pictures of the various flags used for postponement, recalls, and other functions to help those who can't always remember what the Code X flag looks like.

Let's recognize the men and women who put us first at the finish line. If your boat is raced to a first place finish in any series during the year please remember that you have an opportunity to name a crew member for the series crew awards. Let me know after the series standings are posted that you want to nominate someone for the award and that you and the crew member plan to attend the next Meeting. Award winners get a certificate and SSSS crew patch along with the well deserved recognition for all they do to make your boat faster than the competition.

The Budd Inlet race course buoys took a bit of a beating this last season. Since the Spring Series we have had to replace or reset several of the marks. Fortunately one wayward buoy landed on Glen Hunter's beach near Boston Harbor and his retrieval saved the race budget a couple of hundred dollars. The Budd Inlet marks remain in the water from the Spring Series through the Fall Series. Spinnaker Handicapping

The Chief Handicapper has asked me to pass on a reminder about use of spinnakers in PHRF racing. The rules as they are now allow use of either symmetric and/or asymmetric spinnakers with no penalty. You are rated for whatever the largest one you use is. However, switching from sprit to mast-mounted pole is not permitted without being specifically rated for it. The Chief Handisapper has stated that

Handicapper has stated that rating will be done conservatively, meaning you will get knocked pretty hard for the privilege for sailing in that configuration.

We have two boats locally that have the ability to fly either sprits with assyms or syms on mast-mounted poles, Silverheels and McSwoosh. They are both currently using the sprit and asymmetric configuration. By current rule, they could fly a symmetric spinnaker from their sprit if they chose without penalty, but not from a mast-mounted pole. To do so they would need to ask to be rated for the mastmounted pole configuration without using the sprit, for which there is no penalty, or ask to be rated to switch freely back and forth, for which there would be a penalty.

Any boat out there that has a cruising spinnaker, flasher, or whatever type of asymmetrical spinnaker you happen to have, can fly it from your mastmounted pole with no penalty, as long as it is no larger than your largest rated spinnaker, and freely swap back and forth. Gybing a mast-mounted asymmetric kite is pretty messy though so it is not a very appealing alternative unless you have a leg without gybes, and then it can be a pretty fast ticket.

Reciprocal Report

Greetings South Sound cruisers! As the reciprocal manager for SSSS I want to bring you up to date on some new information and my own observations while out cruising this summer. We were out for five weeks and availed ourselves of five reciprocal agreements while out. You may want to cut this column out and paste it into your reciprocal Handbook.

Do remember when you are out and about using your reciprocal agreement with other clubs, you're also an ambassador for our club. Always fly your burgee and have your Membership card handy! We've

started writing thank you letters to the various clubs we visit. It can only foster goodwill and a continued connection between our clubs.

Bremerton Yacht Club was our first YC, up Dyes Inlet into Phinney Bay. Very nice people, they have one of the last operating marine railways still in operation. We had a chance to see it in operation during our stay.

Kingston Cove YC is always a favorite for us. The Port of Kingston has a little electric car they allow you to use to re-provision at the grocery store.

Flounder Bay YC was our jumping off point to the San Juans. Again, very nice people, they allow visiting boaters to use vacant club slips when their members are out. Flounder Bay, just off Burrows Bay, seems tight, but there is plenty of room to maneuver inside. Lopez Pass is only 6 miles across Rosario Strait.

Swinomish YC seems to not mind if you use the inside of their reciprocal dock. In our Handbook it says use only the outside of the dock but while we were there a few other club boats used the inside. Keep in mind it does shallow on the inside so watch the tides

The reciprocal moorage at Oak Harbor has changed. Instead of being out at the end of F dock, they moved it in closer to the ramp and marina office. As you approach the marina entrance you'll see a sign on the outside of the green breakwater wall pointing to port that say Reciprocal Moorage. Turn to port and follow along the outside of the breakwater. Ahead you'll see

a green marker, keep it to port and turn to starboard at the end of the breakwater. Keep the green markers and the diamond markers to port. The reciprocal dock is just ahead to starboard. It sounds confusing until you actually see it then it becomes clearer. The turning room at the reciprocal dock is tight at low tide, you may want to pull into a guest dock inside and walk the docks to see if there is an opening on the reciprocal dock.

Oak Harbor YC hosts a steak dinner every Wednesday. and they welcome visitors. If you plan on going, phone ahead by noon and they'll put you on the

list for dinner. Only \$10.00 for a great steak dinner with all the fixings. Friday is burger potluck night, the same phoneahead procedure is recommended.

Last year we had some confusion about Brownsville YC and their reciprocal agreement. Turns out Brownsville YC only allots \$200.00 per month for reciprocal use at Brownsville Marina. After that is used up you may not be able

to get a reciprocal at Brownsville. So get there early in the month.

There's something about Poets Cove that makes you smile. Perhaps it's the picture of

swash-buckling pirates, or crafty rum runners that you conjure up in your mind when you hear the name. Whatever it is, one thing is certain: Nestled below the tree-lined bluffs of Mount Norman, this marina provides more than merely a place to clear Canadian Customs, fuel up at the accessible fuel dock, or tuck-in to escape foul weather. The scenery is breath-taking; the staff is warm and welcoming. Something about this port is indefinable and compelling.

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Find It on the Web Site

In last year's Member survey I asked what people had trouble finding on the web site. The three things below were the most often mentioned. I do not understand the problem finding them. Yet several people had enough trouble finding these things that they mentioned it. So let's take a look at what is hidden in plane sight.

A link to the Calendar, an icon of a wall calendar with the name Calendar on it, is in the upper left of most every page, including the Entry Hall. It shows the date for all upcoming events. If you follow the link for the event you can get the time and place.

Links to officer contact information, e-mail and phone, can be found in two places on the Entry Hall page. Upper right there is a link in smaller type that says Officers. Near the bottom middle left, in larger type, is a link to the Business Office which has the information. The e-mail for that program chair is in every Office.

To find the sailing instructions, courses, schedule, and the like for a race program, start by going to the Office for that program: PHRF, Portsmouth, or Stars. Then look in the left side frame for the link. You may have to scroll down.
