Southern Sound Series Rep Report: Winter Vashon

The first race of the four-race Southern Sound Series lived up to its name: **Winter!** Seventeen SSSS boats registered for the romp around Vashon Island and at least three decided that the weather was too cold and windy while another two did not finish. It was **Freezing** and **Windy!**

The delivery from Olympia to Tacoma required the boats moored in Swawntown to cut their way through the ice. Those who delivered on Thursday had it easier than those who chose to go on Friday. Friday saw stiff northerly winds

against an ebb tide. The smaller the boat, the more spray froze on the deck and the rougher the ride.

Tacoma Yacht Club hosted a warming prerace party and taco bar Friday night. Class breaks were announced and then most sailors retired to their boat or went back to their warm home! For those who slept on their boats, the wind howled all night and the temperatures plummeted below freezing.

Crews started arriving around 0700 and by 0800 the two cruising classes headed out to the start. This year the slower classes start ahead of the faster boats. The start witnessed

strong, cold north winds and several boats had to reef their main. As the fleet tacked their way up Colvos Passage, the wind moderated ever so slightly. Most of the faster fleets started passing the cruising classes at the north end of the Island.

As the racers rounded the mark boat at the island's north end spinnakers were launched and the race to the south began. The wind moderated even more and those who had a reef in their main shook them out. Ice still remained on the decks from the spray on the beat up Colvos Passage.

The spinnakers were held to the finish line in front of the Tacoma Yacht Club. All finishers were able to cross the line before dark.

The Southern Sound Series implemented the US Sailing Regatta Network program for registration and scoring. The results were posted on the TYC site shortly after the last boat finished.

The delivery back to Olympia was with a flood tide and wind behind us. *Koosah* was able to view the OYC lighted boat parade as we entered Budd Inlet. Very pretty! We had to motor through the ice to get into our Swawntown slip, but happy to arrive!

The second race is Duwamish Head on 11 January. Registration may be accomplished on the web site, ssseries.org. The third race is our own Toliva Shoal on 8 February followed by the Islands Race on 15 March.

RC Report


The Island Series is complete with very few boats competing due to too much and too little wind. Of the four races only Hope Island produced more than a handful of finishers. Since D Class did not have enough boats participating in the Fall and Island Series we will not have a split fleet this year and all D class boats will be scored as a single group for each of the series which make up the Season Championship.

The first two Inlet Series races are in January with Eld Inlet on January 4 and McAllister Creek on January 25. RC boats are *Aquavit* and stake boat *Tushita* for Eld and *Kaitlin* for McAllister. Thank

you to all who volunteer but there are still two RC openings for the Henderson Inlet race on February 4 and for the Maclean Memorial on March 29. Please sign up for RC duty if you haven't done so yet.

The Race Committee met in December to discuss several proposed changes to the racing program.

Next year the Herron Island Race will include an



Johnson Point will be added as a mark of the course and a possible shortened course point for the Eagle Island and McAllister Creek Races

Beginning in the 2014-15 season each skipper who intends to race in the Island or Inlet Series Races will be required to submit a PIYA Category III certificate indicating that their boat meets the equipment requirements designated for Category III. VHF Channel 72 will be used race communications.

The Race Committee will endeavor to include a short safety presentation at each Meeting.

The committee discussed changing the Maclean Memorial race to a double-handed, reverse start, overnight race to either Tacoma or Longbranch. Clark McPherson agreed to work on the logistics for moorage and race details for a future decision by the Committee.

They were due at the first of the year but here at SSSS we give you a grace period. We start checking with Toliva, which means now.

Star Fleet

We had our annual fall gathering to discuss the state of the fleet, get started on Black Star Regatta planning, and to make proposals to be brought to the fleet in the Spring. The following are the Meeting Notes:

Black Star Regatta committee - Vicky Sheldon will chair Black Star Regatta committee this year. Thank you Vicky for volunteering. The first Black Star Regatta meeting is to be at Vicky's on December 18. The usual pot luck starting at 1800. The second meeting is



tentatively scheduled for January 29 and will be confirmed at the first meeting.

The following have been nominated and seconded for officers: Fleet Captain - Sherwood Smith, Race Chair - John Thompson, Treasurer - Larry Kutz, Secretary - Steve Worcester. This slate of officers will be voted on at the spring meeting pending acceptance of those nominated.

Treasurer Report: Larry Kutz reported that the Star Fleet has been provided with a separate checking account under the SSSS account at Twin Star Credit Union. The Treasurer, and fleet Captain when the treasurer is not available, will be able to write checks for fleet expenses. The current balance in the account is #1.816.

The following budget is proposed for 2014 to be voted on at the Spring Meeting: \$900 - Runabout maintenance and repairs \$200 - Fuel \$100 - RC Gear \$100 - Season Trophies (TBD) \$516 - Outboard Replacement Account

This is the regular season budget, the Black Star Regatta budget will be established by the Black Star Regatta committee. The fleet dues are proposed to remain \$20 for the coming season to be paid by the first Monday of the season.

It has been seen that participation is declining since the peak in 2009. We discussed some of

the possible reasons for the decline this past season. To address this Bill wants to take the lead in getting more of the available boats out. He indicated that there are at least 30 boats available to race. The following participation goals have been set for the coming year: Black Star Regatta - 22 boats; Average number per night 16-18 boats

We would like input from the fleet on what would get you out on the racecourse more, and increase participation in the racing program this coming year. The following proposals have been made and seconded for discussion and adoption

at the Spring Meeting:

Proposal #1 - Eliminate the series scoring. Score the night and the season only. Post the season score each week. Reason for the proposal - the series scores really do not do anything. People seem to just want to know how they did for the night and the other series are an afterthought.

Proposal #2 - Race 3 Mondays and on the 4th Monday of the month the fleet will be split into 2 fleets based on the results of the previous 3 nights.

The two fleets will have separate starts with those in the upper half in A Fleet and those in the lower half in B Fleet. Teams will be established with the highest seeded member of A paired with the lowest seed of B, etc. the winner of the night will be the lowest combined score of A+B. The night will count for participation toward the 50 percent participation for the season, but the scores will not be included in the season scoring.

Proposal #2 -Alternate: The score will be counted in the season with the placing for a race being based on the combined score of A+B. Reason for the proposal - to help with participation by changing things up for one night a month. It would allow for upper half teaming up and encouraging their teammate in the lower half of the fleet. Giving separate starts will allow boats of the same skill level to race against each other once a month.

Proposal #3 - Fun Mondays. There would be up to one fun race a month. The night would be counted toward the 50 percent participation for the season but the races would not be scored for the season or series. The races would be designed to have fun and change things from the normal racing. Reason for the proposal - to promote fun and seamanship and give fleet

members an opportunity to do some different activities and promote participation.

The following possibilities for fun races were discussed. There are other possibilities that could be implemented, the important thing is to decide if this is something we want to include in the program for the coming season.

Envelope Race - the race committee sets a number of marks around the race area and a starting line. The race is started normally, however, the racers are given a series of numbered envelopes to be opened in order. After starting the racers are allowed to open the first envelope which will tell them where they are to go next and what they need to do. After the last envelope task is completed the boat can finish as required. All normal ROW rules apply during the race.

Flag Race - the marks are set around the inlet with colored or numbered flags attached to them. The race will be started normally and the racers can go to the marks in any order. The first boat to finish in the same direction as the start with all the required flags wins.

Proposal #4 - when the race is canceled those that show up ready to race count toward the 50 percent participation for the season, but are not scored in the season scoring. If there are series scores, those showing up to race will be given the score of 1 plus the number that came to race and those not coming out will scored DNC as it is currently scored for the series. Your 3 best scores will be counted for a series as it is currently. Reason for the proposal, to give those that show up to race credit for showing up, even if the race is canceled.

Eric Egge is making a Season Champion trophy to be put in the trophy case at Tugboat Annie's. He is also continuing to make the First First Award for those that get their first first place finish in a race with our fleet.

If you have other proposals for the spring meeting please submit them for consideration. The fall meeting is tentatively scheduled Sunday March 16 at Lord Bill's. If you want to make a formal proposal to the program for the coming season at the meeting, please send them to me 2 weeks prior so they can be sent out to the fleet beforehand.

As I write it is almost Christmas. When you get this it will be time to think about getting all the Stars ready for the up coming season. It has been a busy fall in the Star shop. Five Stars had project work done on them and the race committee boat got a long needed face lift. Its amazing what a fresh coat of paint will do; along with fixing up and cleaning things on the boat. At this time, I still need to finish the last of my woodys, Glisten, and make up one boom and three masts before launch time. Starting

around the first of February, we will be doing the bottoms of the fleet and some of the Gig Harbor fleet. Letter: Eagle Island Race

"Know when to fold 'em." -Kenny Rogers. Ok, Kenny wasn't singing about sailboat racing but it's still good advice.

Pandora, our sturdy 1965 Cal 36, left the dock with a single reef in the main and our 110% jib. Predictions were for 15 to 20 knot winds, building to 35. We had a crew of six, most were experienced in strong winds. We were confident that we were prepared for these conditions. We had a great start and a lot of fun sailing to Dofflemeyer Point but the wind was building rapidly beyond predictions. The tops of the waves were blowing off, creating white foam all around us. As we turned east it was apparent that we needed to shorten sail further. We ducked into the lee of Squaxin Island to put in a second reef and switch to a storm jib. After the sail change, we decided to get back into the wind to see if we wanted to continue racing.

We re-entered Dana and it was immediately obvious that the wind was not letting up. The radio was busy with boats abandoning the race. Retreating boats were beating into a brutal chop which we knew would get worse as soon as the tide turned. We turned back inside Squaxin to consider our options. No one on board wanted to drop out but as captain I wanted to keep it fun for the crew especially for the one crew member only on his third sail.

I explained that in these conditions it might be better to abandon the race, to stay in one piece with no one hurt and no damage to the boat so that we could race another day. Could we have finished? Yes. Would there be injuries or damage to the boat? Maybe not, but was it worth the chance? We retired from the race and



headed off to anchor.

Before I start any long distance race, I always gather weather information, review the tides, and have a "get out of jail free" plan, a place to duck into or a route that puts us out of harm's way if need be. In this case, we ended up sailing to OYC's

Island Home. Most of the crew got a ride home. One crew member and I brought the boat back the next morning. We had to motor because there was *no* wind.

I look forward to the SSSS Island and Inlet Series each

year. These races can see heavy winds which are good training for the bigger races like the South Sound Series, Smith Island, Swiftsure and Southern Straits. These races are PIYA Category II and III which *Pandora* is equipped to manage. We race because we like to, at times it is a challenge, but I believe it is up to each

skipper and crew to determine whether they should go on or not.

The standard of care for sail boat racing is clear. We have the PIYA Category Requirements and *The Racing Rules of Sailing* which includes as a Fundamental Rule, Decision to Race, "the responsibility of whether or not a boat races must rest finally with the boat and her crew. The organizers cannot be blamed or held responsible for not

abandoning a race because of bad weather." We should abide by these and not put the burden on the Race Committee or the Sailing Society. It is up to the Captain and Crew of each vessel to decide when to fold'em.


