can sample 15 or 20 different deserts to see if they go with *beer*! June 9 it all starts about 1800, but if you want to help set up, come down a little early.


If you are a racer, come collect your trophies, and brag a little. Or maybe a lot.

deadline, feature Fully Crewed, Single, or Double-Handed, divisions with separate spinnaker, and non-spinnaker divisions. Any type of self-steering apparatus may be used during this event, but competitors must maintain a watch on deck at all times. Full sailing instructions are on the web site; this is a summary.

The first start will be 1000 on Saturday and 0900 on Sunday. All boats, regardless of division or class, will start in reverse order based on their handicap. The slowest rated boat will start first. The fastest rated boat will start last, by the amount of time she owes the slowest boat. She need to catch and pass her by the finish to save her time. A document showing the *exact* starting times and racing class for each boat will be available on our web site.

All boats without a current PHRF certificate will be assigned a rating by our Handicappers. Don't be shy, just let me know that you want to race. We will get you

a handicap. Once you have a handicap, you can look up your start time on our web site.

The course Saturday is Olympia Shoal to Toliva Shoal leaving Anderson Island to port. Then back Sunday, leaving Anderson Island to port. Should all the boats in a class fail to finish the long course within the time limit, scoring will be based on the times logged by each boat at Johnson Point.

What ever the wind, we want everyone at least to Toliva by 1800. This is also a social event. SSSS has reserved the finger piers for Saturday night at the Narrows Marina.

There is power available. If we need more space the marina agreed to let us use the temporary moorage spaces.

Boats will be required to pay for overnight moorage. The Marina has agreed to give participating Members a discounted rate of \$0.75 per foot and \$4.50 for shore power. Narrows Marina, phone: (253) 564-3032, email: nmbt@narrowsmarina.com.

The sun peeked from behind large billowy clouds as I got underway for the McMicken Island Cruise on Saturday about 1200. The dragon boat races had

begun and a transit just inside the buoys marking the turning circle across from the port was necessary to avoid the race course and the three dragon boat crews paddling hard down the stretch. Winds were light and the water was calm.

Just west of the shipping channel and buoy number 6, the Adventuress lay at anchor. What a beautiful sight she is. Her mission: picking up students from Portland for a three day seamanship adventure to begin on Monday.

Further on, the Black Star Regatta had gotten underway and another change of course to avoid the race course was necessary. I don't usually follow the shipping channel past the Olympia Golf and Country club but a change from the more direct route was a pleasant change in scenery.

The tide had changed by the time I entered Dana Passage and the transit to Wilson Point was quick. Some showers began as I approached Wilson Point. They become a heartier rain as I entered the cove created by McMicken Island and the spit to Hartstene Island. Several boats had arrived and I noted a power boat named Gadzooks. I knew that name from a J-30 owned by club members Gary and Megan Martin. I anchored just north of the spit in about 20 feet of water. Once I had the tender in the water I made my way around with the beer and water cooler to welcome the boats that had arrived. I had plenty of time before dinner to visit with Gary and Megan and it was good to see them out on the water and as always, so full of positive energy.

Dinner ashore was at 1800 and there was a wonderful compliment of main dishes, salads and desserts. The grass was tall in the meadow around the three picnic tables. The weather had gotten very sunny just before dinner and we had a lovely evening and departed for our boats just before sunset.

Sunday morning we had breakfast of pancakes, sausages and fruit salad aboard Passages at 0900. By 1030 most boats had gotten underway and many had light sailing in Case Inlet followed by a "screaming sail," Debra's words, through Dana Passage and all the way to West Bay.

LifeSling Clinic June 6

Our annual LifeSling Clinic will begin at 0900 at the Olympia Yacht Club on June 6. Space is limited so if you have not signed up yet, please call Dee Saller or me at 491-0175 or e-mail me at hsaller214@aol.com.

The Clinic will provide you with about two hours of classroom instruction on the proper methods for using the LifeSling and the hoisting tackle to retrieve an overboard victim and get them back onto the boat. We follow that with dockside drills where you get to do a dry run through the steps of a rescue. We also help to make sure the hoisting tackle is set up properly for each boat involved.

The next step is the best reason to take this class. We will go out on the water and all participants will do an actual rescue of a volunteer victim in a survival suit.

This is a great way to learn this valuable skill and have fun at the same time. Please sign up right away.

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Get Ready for the 4th Annual Soldier Sailing June 13

By the time you read this we will be putting the finishing touches on this years Soldier Sailing but we know we will need help in certain areas

Currently we have 14 boats to carry soldiers and their familys, which is a little short of the numbers we need. There is always a little boat jockeying, someone has an unexpected mechanical problem or they get called away for a family matter. Saturday morning is always busy with set up and greeting the soldiers and their families. We start at 1000, everyone gathers near the knoll by the restrooms at Swantowns guest docks. The soldiers are supposed to show up at 1100 but true to military training they usually show up about 1030 to 1045 and then the kids need to be kept busy and we need lots of hands to greet soldiers and help them checkin. This is also the time to fit the kids with life vests so we are sure they get the right size. We also get the families boarded on the boats.

We could use some extra hands on Saturday morning. The Saturday day is a little like the military, wait wait wait and then rush like the dickens to get everything done then wait some more. So Saturday morning is a good time to help, see everyone and be on your way by noon when all the boats depart.

Our second Saturday start is about 1500, that is when the food gets moved from OYC, the grills get

started and we put on the finishing touches for the hamburgers and hot dogs. We may need a little help again, many of the morning people just stay around for the day, so I don't know for sure.

If there is wind of any sort we will be having a race to the dock so the

Women's Boating Seminar Centers on Safety

On the water everyone is vulnerable. Responsible boaters prepare for potential hazards themselves rather assume they can rely on someone else in a crisis. The tenuous status of the Harbor Patrol and a recent tragedy here in South Sound compelled a focus

on boating safety as the theme for the Sixth Annual South Sound Women's Boating Seminar held May 16 at the Olympia Yacht Club. The Seminar distinguishes itself from many other nautical events in that it addresses all avenues of boating: motors, wind, and paddle. The seminar sold out. With several regional speakers and a hands-on fair, the seminar was conducted using both the main clubhouse of Olympia Yacht Club and the Jan Visser Memorial boathouse at the dock.

The morning started with a presentation by Sarah Hanavan on cold water survival as she recalled her experience during last November's Eagle Harbor Race

and what could be learned from what they did right and what they will prepare for differently.

Dee Saller, assisted by Judi Kruller, discussed and illustrated the lifesaving LifeSling system, designed to retrieve boaters stranded overboard. Pulling a person from the water onto the deck vessel can be all but impossible, even in fair weather. This device makes rescue possible in an otherwise tragic situation. "I was amazed at how high you have to lift a person but now I'm confident that if properly trained my kids could learn this." Said Elisa Lyles of OYC,

Alison Mason, a specialist in boat systems, installation and repair showed participants the value of "spelunking" to spot and prevent issues in the inspection of their watercraft .Using humor, detailed images and actual examples of worn and corroded fittings. She took her audience through the tiny spaces that are so often neglected, explained what to look for and why these tell tales signs are so critical. "Alison



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taught me how to look for things that I would never dream of and she taught me how to fix problems", reported Laura Way of Totten Shores in Shelton.

Communication during an emergency is critical on open water. While many people often rely on cell phones, these frequently

fail in times of crisis for a myriad of reasons: low battery, salt water damage, and no signal to name a few. This leaves the VHF radio a reliable lifesaving resource for maritime adventurers. Lynne Reister and Captain Mary Campbell demonstrated how to use the VHF radio in small groups, focusing on the protocol for emergency requests and calls for help. Participant Isa Silver, Hood River Yacht Club, said, "It's hard to learn new skills without practice. I liked that this VHF session gave us each a chance to practice an emergency call with the Coast Guard or other boaters."

With stations spread out within the clubhouse the deck and the dock, the hands-on activities gave women a chance to move from station to another. Many tried their skills at knot tying with Jeanne Rynne and Judy Grable. Ron Holtcamp helped identify the differences in a variety of PFDs what considerations should be made in selecting and fitting one. Dee Saller demonstrated more details from on the LifeSling system. Women had an opportunity to move out to the dock as Capt. Mary Campbell and Capt. Mary Fitzgerald facilitated line heaving, an essential skill for all boaters and outdoors. Penny Shen, Tacoma, said, "I never learned how to toss a line before. It's easy when you learn the right method."

In the boathouse, EMT Sherry Register discussed how to prepare for and what medical aid can be given in the event of an emergency onboard. Then, Sherry walked participates through a demonstrated a scenario to treat and secure a person for rescue and evacuation.



Participants in the main clubhouse were riveted for the lively presentation as Mary Campbell tackled the issue of crew safety from both the perspective of crew and captain. Drawing on her extensive

experience in both positions, Mary emphasized the overall vessel safety, as well and personality specific precautions. Mary illustrated red flags and remedies with colorful anecdotes.

Mary Ross a USCG licensed captain and a certified American Sailing Association Instructor, closed the seminar by posing What if? scenarios. Mary asked her audience to move beyond recall and merge previous knowledge with adaptive skills and think on their feet in response to

specific conditions and resources.

The educational exhibits that rimmed the perimeter of the Yacht club included the Olympia Power Squadron, Olympia Harbor Patrol, and the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 38.

The day-long event provided a variety of experiences and topics for the Northwest women boaters with a delicious smorgasbord buffet lunch included. Participants were each given a waterproof portfolio filled with coupons, magazines and items useful for nautical

travel.

The Seminar offered several raffles to raise funds for Girls at the Helm. This scholarship program provides an opportunity for girls to build self-



Our Budget for 2015-16

Though our Membership year begins in September, our budget year runs from July 1 to June 30, and the chart here shows what it will be in 2015-6 compared to the past year: income in the left four columns and expenses in the columns on the right.

I'll report in September what our total expenses have been in 2014-15. There is less point in doing that now because May and June are big expense months.


The numbers in the chart refer to the 2015-16 budget but you can see that for some items they are smaller for the coming year. The reason is that Membership is down now compared to 2013-14 (though racing membership is not), and we couldn't be sure we would get it back up again, so we assumed that it would be about the same.

Special Requirements:

paragraph 1. replace "the line bearing ... 47.10.694" with:"the Johnson Point line"

paragraph 2 replace all with: "Daily log sheets will be collected at the Narrows Marina on Saturday and the Eastside Tavern, 410 4th Ave E, on Sunday. GPS time will be used for all recorded times. If the shortened course option is used, failure to turn in a log sheet for each day will result in a boat being scored as DNF for that day.

Saturday August 22, Olympia Shoal to Toliva Shoal leaving Anderson Island to port
