Sign up for LifeSling Clinic

The LifeSling Clinic will be on June 6, starting at 0900 with class room instruction. That will be followed by dockside drills and actual on-the-water rescues of volunteers wearing survival suits.

The LifeSling is recognized as the best way to get a person in the water back to the boat and, most importantly, on the boat.

The LifeSling Clinic is your best opportunity to learn the proper techniques for deploying the LifeSling, getting back to the person in the water, rigging the hoisting tackle and using the LifeSling and tackle to single-handedly lift the victim safely back into the boat. Basic sailing skill is required.

Space is limited for this class so please reserve your place by signing up soon. You can call Dee Saller or me at (360) 491-0175 or e-mail us at hsaller214@aol.com. The cost is just \$15 per person. There is no charge for skippers who sign up two more of their crew for the class.

We also need volunteer victims willing to go overboard and be rescued several times. We will provide survival suits that are waterproof, mostly. This is actually a lot of fun and a very good way to learn what to do, and not do, to successfully perform a

LifeSling rescue.

This is a great chance for cruisers to give racing a try; you will have the start line to yourselves. We should all arrive to the Narrows Marina at roughly the same time to enjoy an evening of fun.

There is plenty of sunlight to go sailing after work and the westerly winds are occasionally beckoning. It is time to get your Hope Island Dash on! Last year Joe

Downing had the best time aboard the venerable Ranger 33 *Vintage*. No times have been reported for 2014-15! You have until the May Meeting to get your race in. So get on it. The race is simple. Go whenever you want. Sail around Hope Island either direction. The start/finish line is an extension of Marks 1 and 4, i.e., the dolphins at each end of the Olympia Shoal. Who will take home the illustrious Andrew Jackson Trophy this season?

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




Cruise News MEMORIAL DAY CRUISE, MAY 23-24

Always watch your charts and don't forget about Wykoff Shoal; pass to the west of the green navigation aids north of Pitt Island. Mind



your depths again northwest of Penrose Point as you enter Mayo Cove. There is a spit that goes out a long way.

Maybe you'll make a weekend of it and spend Friday night at Longbranch or anchored in Filucy Bay and stay on at Penrose till Monday or head on down to Oro Bay for Sunday night. However you do it, the Memorial Day Cruise is always fun. We hope to see you out there.

Black Star Regatta

The 2015 Black Star Regatta had it all: wind from the south, wind from the north; no wind, tons of wind; sun, rain. Also a non-stop line of smiling faces ... until masts started breaking, that is.

Our outstanding PRO, Rod Tharp, led a crack Race Committee team in placing and setting marks to match the swinging winds while managing to start not one, not two, but three fleets. A total of sixteen Star boats came out to race. The fleet was joined by four i550s, their third year in the regatta), and five Lasers in their inaugural year.

After a drifter of Race 1 and a steadywind Race 2, the wind clocked and Race 3 was set opposite to the priors: the windwark mark became the leeward, the leeward became the windward. With Pax positioned between a start pin and a finish pin, It seemed like a simple switch. Try telling that to the large number of boats. myself included, that crossed closed lines, did not cross required lines, and/or circled buoys backwards, all while the wind kicked up to keep everyone busy inside their boats! Note to future Race Committees: having the bow pointed the wrong way may cause more trouble than turning the boat around, at least for the racers.

"Halftime" began when an i550 got tangled with the RC anchor line; it continued for an hour when the wind completely died. Boats rafted up, beers and tequila were shared, and the only movement was with the tide. Eventually, the wind returned and RC got two more solid races run, plus a general recall after some barging near the boat resulted in a bump to Pax.

The day ended with a screamer. The wind picked up from the north, and after a fast upwind beat the Stars headed south with a squall making things interesting. The fleet scattered, trying to find room to chicken-gybe after watching two masts come down on actual gybes. The RC smartly set the finish at the leeward mark; most boats were happy to not need to turn around twice more before heading for home. Even so, one i550 capsized and turtled, and most racers had an adventure just getting back to the dock. While many came in limping or bruised, it made for some good stories at the Regatta dinner.

The dinner itself was well-attended, with some sixty sailors and guests enjoying beers and Tugboat Annies catering. The raffle draws sent many sailors home with great prizes; if you missed out, be sure to be a part of it next year. The proceeds will go to the OYC Youth Sailing Program and

to the BISF Maintenance Fund for the yellow runabout.


Sunday was a beautiful sailing day. Cloudy skies with the occasional sunburst, and steady winds from the south/southwest. Almost every boat out Saturday returned Sunday. One skipper, de-masted Saturday, even found an alternate boat to race Sunday! The race committee got in four more Star and i550 races, and five Laser races. Unlike Saturday when the shifty winds necessitated short courses, Sunday's races sent the fleet well up and down Budd Inlet. and is guaranteed to have resulted in some great photographs from the three, 3, photographers on course. With another squall threatening, and the fleet getting tired, RC ended the last race early and the group returned to Westbay for snacks and brief awards ceremony.


