Treasurer's Note

Here are a couple of charts to catch you up on how expenses and income were at the end of our financial year on June 30th. The main point is that our total expenditure remained within our total revenue. As usual, some line items were over-budget and some were under, though none by very much as you can tell from the bar chart. The line graph simply finishes off the same one shown in the June Ship-to-Shore by including June figures.

Other points to note:

- We had 224 club members this year compared to 220 last year, and 49 paid-up racers as opposed to 58 last year.
- We had almost \$600 in our checking account at the end of the year, not including a little over \$1,000 that we are holding for Soldiers Sailing.
- In addition to our checking account we have about \$1,000 in an account that is set aside for equipment expenditures (e.g. projector, buoys), and \$7,000 in a reserve account which we try to keep at a level that is about half our total annual expenditure of around \$14,000.
- As always we had substantial income and expenditure totaling between \$4,000 and \$5,000 for activities that are meant to sustain themselves, such as burger nights, merchandise (caps, burgees, etc.), and calendars.

Thank you to all the new and returning Members who have paid their dues for the 2016-2017 year! I you haven't paid yet, please do so soon. Remember, for the 2016-2017 year we will be

This year we will be stop sending the Ship-to-Shore after this issue, so, please, renew now.

Ciara won the Season Championship.


We had at least 12 different types of boats and at least 36 different skippers out during the


summer.

RC Report

Fall races have started and we look forward to another year of friendly competition on the water. This is also a good time to look back at the past season, particularly the non-series races: Maclean Memorial, Jack and Jill, and Single Handed Races. Participation in these races seems to be declining yearly.

Working backwards, the Single Handed race had one participant showup at the starting line. This skipper

informed the race committee that he really needed to get some boat maintenance done, as in changing out the boat's Y-valve so the race was called and the Y-valve got changed. What are your thoughts on the single-handed race? Date, race time, courses?

The Jack and Jill was better attended, six boats, but no wind. After drifting

around for an hour and a forecast of more glassy water, the race was call. By that point, many were already swimming off their boats on the warm, sunny, but windless day. A good time was had by all and more than a few brews were opened, but there was no race. Again, what are your thoughts?

Finally, the Maclean Memorial has been an overnight race/cruise the last two years. This year's Saturday race was a mix of some wind and several hours of drifting with sails impersonating curtains. Mike Farley, Nauti Dog swept the field in a time of 06:42:00. Well done Mike! Mike finished with no boats insight to his stern or off his bow for that matter, he was the only racer! Four boats originally signed up to race but three dropped out. So this invitation is offered to those


larger boats who have not participated in the Series.

The benefits and challenges are numerous. The skipper must plan in greater detail than our local zip code races. Details include the delivery to Tacoma, Des Moines, and Gig Harbor and the return. Crew transportation, meals, and safety must be considered.

SSSS racing community consists of PHRF, D-Fleet, dingy, and Star fleets; more that most of the yacht clubs within the State.

Our racers usually stay within the Olympia zip code, which is understandable with the dinghies and Stars. The opportunity exists, however, for the larger boats to sail out of this zip code. That opportunity is the Southern Sound Series.



The race strategy is similar to our own zip code racing but the distances are longer, around thirty miles. Talk with other SSSS racers who have participated in years past for advice and/or encouragement.

The races offer some stiffer competition from the racers up north. There are boats that are not found in our zip code: Transpac 52s, J-160, Santa Cruise 70, Riptide 35 and numerous newer high tech boats. South Sound racers that often dominate their class in Budd Inlet find that their match is often met with the boats from the Seattle area. This is a learning experience that benefits them upon their return to their zip code.

For those who are not high tech the Series offers two classes that do not require Pacific Handicap Racing Fleet handicaps and membership: The cruising class non-flying sails and the cruising class flying sails. This is a nice way to break into the Series to discover another fun way to race.

Perhaps most importantly are the new friendships made during the Series. At the parties before and after the race and on the race course, racers are always a fun group to be around. Just think about our own Toliva Shoal!

Uncle Juicy Goes Pineapple — Again Victoria to Maui and Return; first printed 1998

For us, the race really started in 1994, after racing in that year's Vic-Maui Race. Joe Dubey said he would like to do the race again, god willing and *Uncle Juicy* capable.

So the starting gun found us at the favored end on port tack and going like hell. *Charisma* and *Jubilee* were alongside. At Race Rocks we still had position on the fleet.

It stayed that way till we were off northern California. There the East Pacific High jumped east and caught us. That allowed *Meastro*, a Newport 41 twelve miles to the east of *Juicy*, to escape. They got into the trade winds first and continually added to their lead.

Fun was had covering the rest of the fleet. Especially *Endeavor II* who we eventually beat by about eighty miles. That earned us second in class, sixth overall.

There were six boats in the class, including 1996 overall winner, *Kismet*. The crew of *Juicy*, Joe Dubey, Bob Connelly, Dennis Gudgell, Loran Carmichael, Lee Rogge, and your author, felt good about our finish.

Whales, porpoises, and other sea creatures seemed few and far between for the Race. But the take home crew, your author, my brother Don, Loran Carmichael, Carl Applebaum, and SSSS Past Commodore Jim Lengenfelder, had more to see.

Humpback whales, pilot whales, and porpoises visited. A group of four humpbacks performed for us. One showed us his tail fin. Carl photographed it. Another breached for us. Large groups of

porpoises visited *Juicy* a number of times, both in the day time and in the dark of the night.

Another boat, *Fastrack*, one day ahead of *Juicy* on the way home, plowed into a whale. The whale struck back with its pectoral fin and they were left with a hole in the hull. When the damage was surveyed after they got back, blubber was found in the damaged area.

The trip took 16 days and 4 hours Victoria to Maui and 17 days and 12 hours back to Neah Bay. There were some magnificent days and nights out there, and a few that are better forgotten.

We were treated well by the sponsors, Royal Vancouver YC and the Lahaina YC. There was a send off party in Victoria. The Hawaiians have a reputation for welcoming the boats in this race. They lived up to that reputation.

The RC, with Ron Ogilvy from RVYC Chairman, did an exceptionally good job. If you followed the Race on the Internet, you must know how good it was. Over two-hundred people were involved in making this the best Race ever.

The year 2000 race should be a great one to plan for.






