Sign Up for LifeSling

It is time to sign up for the June 3, 2017 LifeSling Clinic. It will begin at 0900 with classroom instruction at the Olympia Yacht Club. During that session, that lasts about two hours, you will get a detailed explanation of how the LifeSling is properly used to get an overboard crew member back onto the boat.

The instruction is followed by dockside drills where you will see how to properly rig the hoisting tackle and then do some dry runs on the technique to use the LifeSling and hoisting tackle. Next you get a chance to put all that knowledge and skill to work as we do real overboard drills with volunteers in survival suits splashing around and hoping to be rescued.

The LifeSling is the best method for one person to rescue someone who has fallen off the boat. To show you what to do in the worst case scenario, each participant does an actual rescue without any help from the other students, although always under the watchful eye of the instructor to ensure safety.

It is best to learn this method, or refresh your skills, on the boat you own or frequently sail on. To encourage skippers and crew to take this class together we will waive the \$15 fee for any skipper who has two or more crew take the class with them.

Basic sailing skills are required. The class lasts most of the day. Space is limited so please call Dee Saller or me at (360) 491-0175 or e-mail us at hsaller214@aol.com to reserve your spot or to ask us questions about the class. It is challenging and a lot of fun. We hope you will join us.

RC Report: Fubar Days

We all have those "Fubar" days! Well we just got done installing a system to ensure that our adjustable tension # 3 jib battens remain with the sail rather than visiting the bottom of Budd Inlet! This was necessitated after one of those truly fubar days. We've all had'em, though none of us want'em.

The fun started as we were getting ready for the first Spring Race, forecast partly sunny, chance of showers, winds 10-12, gusts to 25. We knew we were going to be a bit light for crew with just five. Then it became four as one had apparently had a long night before. Oh well, we'll just sail without the chute today.

Heading out it was obvious the wind was up, pretty steady around 18 with real gusts and lots of white caps and some nasty clouds, the squalls were coming. As we motor north bound past the RC we're getting the #3 up on the deck, sheets tied on, halyard attached, ready for hoist, oops, that's not the heavy air #3, it's the heavy #1. OK, regroup, stash the #1 and bring the #3 up.

While two of the crew are working on getting the #3 rigged, and realizing

that time is getting a little tight for the start, I start to get the main up. Back and forth cockpit to boom to remove sail ties and back again, sail flapping in the wind. The last of the main goes up now with the help of jumping the halyard.

Ready for the jib? She's through the pre-feeders and in the slot, but the jib halyard clutch is *open*. Next we know the wind has caught the sail between the pre-feeder and slot, pulled her free and the #3 is flying free of the headstay slot, wind pulling her ever up. The sail, now flying free, is pulled back in, rethreaded through the pre-feeder and ready to hoist again. About this time I notice the A and S classes have started.

Second time's the charm, well maybe not. Second jib hoist goes well except after the flogging of the first un-hoist, both sheet bowlines have loosened and now come free. The #3 is now a giant pennant flying off the forestay. With crew trying to hold the foot close to the boat I struggle to refeed the sheet through the clew. Ha, Good Luck. Oh, and what was that splash? Lower #3 batten has decided it is time to part company and visit the bottom of Budd Inlet. Ok let's bring the #3 down again. Retie the sheets, get ready to hoist, but we're a half mile the wrong side of the start line and there go the B and D classes! What a start of the day.

Time for a quick huddle. The list of issues today is long indeed and we'll be at least fifteen minutes late for the start. It didn't take long to agree, it's Miller time. We radio the race committee, "Folie `a Deux withdrawing from the race". The engine is started, the re-prepped but un-hoisted #3 is





bungeed to the deck. We go to work bring the main down. With the main down we cruise south past *Transition* and motor by the north bound D Fleet boats. We get a yell from *Jolly Rumbellow*, "everyone alright?" Embarrassed, we yell yes, just not our day! About the time we reach the windward mark we note that the wind has now dropped to 8 to 10. Should we turn back to the race again? No, we can see another squall approaching. Better to call it than push the luck we've had today.

Back at the dock, we get the #3 folded, boat unrigged, and we settle for a

deserved beer with a few other SSSS dock buddies. The second squall, after our withdrawal, now arrives with windblown large hail. We dive from the cockpit into the boat just in time to see *Koosah's* mast moving up the opposite fairway.

We hop up to help her into her slip as the hail piles up on the dock and boats. Safely landed, the hail stops as fast as it started and we help *Koosah* fold her sails. As normal, *Koosah*, assumes her role as the social boat and stories of the day unfold. The race for B and D classes was a non-race. The race was called when the leeward mark decided it was time to head for shore dragging her anchor. What a day! As we sit in *Koosah*, Dave says that he is nearing another Perfect Attendance racing season, his seventeenth. *Yes Seventeenth*! His nearest competition has two.

After seventeen years with Perfect Attendance, Dave and *Koosah* must have had more than a few of those fubar days but he has persevered. Congratulations Dave, the next time we are having one of those days we'll think about what you have accomplished!

My mainsail cover is generously cut from quality fabric and fully appointed with all the snap catches, zipper, etc. They also make a wide variety of other boat canvas products that you can have cut to size. So if your canvas is getting tired and you don't want to wipe out the bank account, you might wish to check them out.

Penrose Point is located in Carr Inlet near Lake Bay. This is typically a very sunny weekend with Saturday play on the spit or in the park. A potluck will be held on shore in the park at 1800 where the

spit divides the high and low picnic areas.

This is a comfortable and roomy anchorage with

some state park mooring balls or a great hold if you wish to anchor.


Extreme Low Tides This Year

We will see an extreme low tide of -3.5ft at 1330 on Saturday! Be sure to leave early

if you want to use Pitt Passage. Pitt is 15 NM from Olympia. If you travel at 6 Kts, you will want to start out from Olympia by

08:00 or so to make it to the pass when the ebb tide hits 0.0 at 11:30. Otherwise, you'll have to wait sometime after 1400 and push against the flood.

On the other hand, you run past Eagle





Island and around Mc Neil Island, adding around 8.6 NM to your

trip. If you decide on Pitt, don't forget about Wykoff Shoal on the Carr Inlet side. Keep a close eye on your chart and remember to pass to the west of the green navigation aids north of Pitt Island. Mind your depths again northwest of Penrose Point as you enter

Mayo Cove. There is a spit that goes out a long way, see the low-

tide photo, below.


