## **RC** Report

With the Fall Series Races wrapping up we are heading into the longer and generally colder, wetter, and windier Island and Inlet Race Series. These races are more challenging in several ways. Currents and the routes you choose to sail become more critical as those currents can drastically affect your velocity made good for the better or worse. If you are newer to racing in the south sound it pays to watch what course the long time south sounders are following.

Another benefit of watching these old timers is that they know where the shoals and bars are located and how to plan a course around those obstructions. I know, we have watched boats round Hope Island, as we are sitting on the bar coming off of Squaxin Island! Pictures of your boat aground are not exactly ego boosters. If you have a chart plotter, pay attention, or study those paper

charts. It pays off, and saves addressing a scraped up keel or worse! It is also best to avoid being the next proud or not so proud holder of the Order of the Olympia Shoal. Just a reminder, a hand held or fixed VHF radio is required on all boats sailing in the Island and Inlet Series Races. Please check in with the RC boat via your radio before the start.

Another sign of the changing seasons is the need for all skippers to sign-up for race committee (RC) duty. We all truly appreciate of the work Bill, Vicky, and Bob do on Transition as the RC boat but they need RC volunteers to make these races possible. Part of being a SSSS racer is an obligation to serve RC duty for one race per year; this is how we keep the program going. Thanks to those of you who have already signed up. Each race is scheduled to start and the same time and has the same time limit. The sailing instructions contain the details.


Class beaks will be announced around 1800 at the Winter Vashon pre-race party Friday night, 1 December 2017 at the Tacoma Yacht Club.

#### Viper 640 Pacific Coast Championships

The Viper 640 class had its left coast championship regatta July 28-30 at Cascade Locks, Oregon, participating in the annual CGOD Regatta along with some adventurous 505s, Fireballs, Lasers, and Wetas.

I was hesitant to participate at first having sailed down there once before on Moore 24s and knowing first hand the area's reputation for high winds is well deserved. My concerns were allayed when I was informed there was an agreement with race management to not race in sustained winds exceeding 25 knots and to abandon any race where

wind speeds reached 30 knots at any time.

What I didn't realize is that that provision in the race instructions was immediately followed with a disclaimer that failure of the race committee to follow that provision was not grounds for protest. No races were postponed or abandoned. The peak measured wind speed was 36.5 knots and we ended up sailing in 20-30 plus for most of the event, those who didn't break stuff and have to retire anyway.

Nobody's going to be ordering new sails as a result of the numerous gear failures that occurred, but lots of other bits got pushed to the breaking point and beyond. Three mast were broken, two halyards, and most

of the rudders and rudder brackets suffered damage to some degree. Boats wiped out, people got separated from boats, our boat included.

Three boats sustained no damage and finished all the races. They finished 1, 2, 3. Of the boats that were not able to finish all the races, I managed to sustain probably the most modest damage and, much to my surprise, finished 4th out of the 13 that participated.

Despite all the carnage, just about everybody seemed to have a good time. Something to do with 80 degrees and fresh water I think. Plus it's tough to beat the scenery.

My damage, as with most of the boats, was related to a recent class modification to the rudder angle. The original design has the rudder raked back a bit from vertical. With more Vipers being sailed in Australia recently and the predominately higher wind speeds there it was discovered a vertical rudder gave better control in higher wind speeds. A new mounting bracket was designed, tested in Australia and declared ready for class wide distribution and made available.

All the boats participating in this event had installed the new brackets and tillers that were part of the upgrade on their boats. Turns out the loads are significantly higher with the new vertical angle when it's blowing the chains off. All but three brackets failed, caused damage to the rudders, and in some cases also damaged the rudder tower that the bracket mounts to. I guess they don't sail in that much wind in Australia. Welcome to the Gorge.
