Past Treasurer's Note on the Past Year

Our financial year goes from July 1st to June 30th, and our last month is usually the one when we spend the most, chiefly because of expenditures on race trophies and the June potluck. With June 2017 now over we can see how we did financially for the past year, and it looks pretty good.

Total income was budgeted at \$12,250 and came out at \$12,584. We expected 220 paying members and got just 213, but we had hoped for 50 racers and with Jeff Johnson's

encouragement ended with 61.


We figured total expenditures would be \$12,500 but we spent only \$10,380. The sources of the economies can be seen in the chart. Lighter paper and mailing in envelopes allowed Steve Worcester to save a lot on Ship-to-Shore, and the speakers Micky McNaughton recruited for the Program did not make big financial demands. Mike Buffo saved on printing by carefully monitoring the numbers of rosters and handbooks actually needed.

A number of items went over budget (e.g. internet fees connected with the changes under

way) but they were all small enough to be collected together under "Other".

That's it, my last little Treasurer's Note. Over four years in this position the form that the accounts and policies have evolved, and as Steve Lewis and a new Board take over you'll get more changes along with the fresh faces. That's what keeps a club like this alive and flourishing.

behind the scenes, getting it done, while we've all enjoyed the fruits of his labor. A big thank you to Steve for all you've done and continue to do for the SSSS.

Several months ago, a group of volunteers started meeting with Joy Johnson and Jim Jones to brainstorm requirements for the new web site. Jim has been diligently working to bring each piece on line, adding plug-ins to increase functionality and ease access.

This web site will truly revolutionize the way that the Club presents itself to visitors and services you, the Members. Here are just a few of the key changes you will notice:

* No more waiting in line to register at Meetings. You will be able to register and pay Membership and race fees 24/7 from the comfort of home. Please consider using this option as it helps streamline our process and gives you more time to socialize at the Meeting!

- * Your *membership renewal* date is current from the day you renew for one year. An e-mail reminder will prompt you to renew online, just like a magazine subscription. Race dues are paid for the season.
- * Current Membership information will be available to Members at any time. We have imported the existing Membership

Roster and, as you renew your Membership, you will be prompted to review and update your record. You'll be able to upload pictures of you and your vessel. The Membership Roster will be protected by a password, so that only Members who are paid up will be able to see other Members' information.

* The new Membership record will allow us to record information of interest to other members, such as MMSI numbers,

different last names for spouses or partners, etc.

- * You will be able to indicate your desire to crew in races or cruises when you renew your Membership each year, and skippers will be able to search the Roster to find crew easily.
- * The navigation is intuitive and user-friendly, with photographs!
- * There are links to many relevant services, such as tide tables, reciprocal moorage information, and other services.

Since Members will be able to access up to date information at any time, we will be able to stop printing Membership Rosters and sailing instructions. They will no longer be distributed to all Members. This allows SSSS to save trees, save

money for the Club, and reduce the workload on the Secretary.

Sailing Instructions and courses can be printed from the web site as PDF files by those who want hard copy.

There are other benefits that might not be obvious to Members and that will make the lives of Cruise and Race Chairs much easier:

* Race chairs for all fleets, as well as the cruise chair, will be able to upload notices, courses and results as soon as they are available so you can see them sooner.

* The Secretary currently spends countless hours manually entering and updating Member records. In addition, the Secretary makes numerous trips to the printer each year to print sailing instructions, Rosters twice, and other Handbook inserts. Going electronic will greatly reduce this workload.

As a next step in bringing SSSS into the 21st century, we plan to phase out printing and mailing the S-t-S, two major expenses for the Club. Once we make that switch, Members will get an e-mail notifying them that the new issue is available, and they will be able to download it to their own device for reading wherever they are in the state of the state

for reading wherever they are in the world!

Note: we will be printing a limited number of S-t-S and Members will be able to select a hard copy option when they register.

Some future additions to the web site can be added with your help! We have thousands of pictures and a place to put them on Google drive but downloading the files is time-intensive. Any volunteers willing to spend a few hours to help? Also, if there are files you've been using but don't see on the new web site, feel free to let us know if you need them on the new site.

We are thrilled to be making this move, and I hope you will join me in thanking Commodore Joy Johnson for her leadership in making this happen, and Jim Jones for his persistent and professional work building this new site. He has done an *amazing job!*

OYSTERFEST, SHELTON YC, OCTOBER 7-8

It's time again to head up Hammersley River...er, Inlet! Make sure your depth sounder is working because it's Shelton Oysterfest time! On Saturday the 7th, the tide at Arcadia Point will run from 14' at 0737 to a 3.4' low at 1338, followed by a

15' high at 1915. Max ebb in Hammersley will be at 11:30 and runs to -2 or -3 knots, depending on the location in Hammersley.

With an adverse current, the trip could take 75-90 minutes, so I suggest we assemble off Hungerford Point around 1330, with the goal of arriving by 1500. A shuttle bus will pick us up, take us to the Oysterfest, and deliver us back at the Shelton YC. We could do a light potluck at 1830 pm to allow maximum time at the Fest. Your Past Commodore, me, is hoping to be back from Alaska if the trip down

the Inside Passage goes as planned. If so, I will host the Cruise. Sunday's tides promise another fun ride home as it will be ebbing from 0930 until 1600, so you will have time to revise the Festival if you need another oyster fix. Make sure to follow your breadcrumbs out!

RC Report

Welcome Back SSSSers! I hope everyone's summer cruises and racing went well with fair winds and calm seas. Now that the summer season Wednesday night races have wrapped up, it's time to start thinking about the longer Saturday races. We have sixteen races scheduled through early next May. These races provide the challenge of racing in nearly any conditions that western Washington may throw our way. It's time to at least dust off those foulies, sailing boots, and a store of hats and gloves.

This also a good time check and review the use of safety equipment. Are you flares current; that's an easy one to miss. Last year, on the way to Swiftsure we had the Coast Guard do a stop and inspect of *Folie a' Deux* just south of the Port Townsend Channel. One of the easily overlooked items is the expiration date on those flares! Fortunately ours were current but they will need to be replaced this year.

Regarding safety, last year I canceled the Eagle Island Race due to forecast gale force winds. That is never an easy decision, but when competent, long time racers start emailing that they will not be racing in those conditions the decision was much easier. It is very helpful if you let me know what you think when the conditions are getting to the point where the safely and equipment failure risks outweigh the joys of sailing. Along those line, just a reminder, a VHF radio is required for the Island and Inlet Race series.

This is also the time to look at scheduling for the four race Southern Sound Series mixed in December through March. This includes the SSSS sponsored Toliva Shoal Race. Though a Tacoma

LifeSling Clinic Good First Step to Safe Summer Sailing

cruising and racing off to a good, safe start by taking the South Sound Sailing Society's annual LifeSling Clinic on June 3, 2017. The clinic explained the proper use of the LifeSling and hoisting tackle to retrieve an overboard victim and get them back onto the boat quickly and safely.

We started with an instructional video from The Sailing Foundation that was narrated by well-known sailing author John Rousmaniere and that featured Port Townsend sailmaker Carol Haase demonstrating a LifeSling rescue.

Next, there was a dry land demonstration, a PowerPoint presentation that includes slides from one of our earlier classes and then dockside drills. Most of

the participants tried out their new found, or newly refreshed, skills by doing actual rescues of volunteer victims wearing bright orange immersion suits. All were successful. The victims, Judi Kruller, Alex Bromen, Carole Johnston and Rob Nelson, were repeatedly lifted back onto the boats safe, sound and, mostly, dry. 
