Commodore's Corner:

This is a Bad News/Good News kind of story. The bad news is that our Club was a victim of fraud and theft earlier this year. The good news is that most of the money was recovered. How did it happen? It was a perfect storm and a crafty thief.

The theft occurred in late summer. Some of our board members were brand new and we were not yet familiar with one

another. All of us were on vacation, which meant that it was normal to be doing Club business by e-mail. A hacker had been studying our web site and was able to gather names and e-mail addresses of board members and enough event information to be able to engage in Club related small talk.

Big business is often attacked in the same way. Someone pretends to be an officer of the corporation and convinces someone in the accounting department to pay an invoice or transfer a large amount of funds. If the accounting department believes the request is from the CEO, the money is paid and the thief is successful. The Olympia Police Department states they get new cases like ours on a daily basis.

In our case, the thief set up an e-mail account in my name and began having email conversations with Beth, our new Treasurer. He even misspelled my name in the fake e-mail account, copying the mistake from our web site which also had my name misspelled. When e-mails showed up on Beth's phone they looked convincingly like they were coming from Jim Larson. Between the convincing deceitful e-mail account and his web site research enabling the thief to sound like a Member, Beth was convinced she was conversing with me.

As a first test of his impersonation, he asked Beth for an update on account balances. When that was successful, he convinced her that we needed to transfer some funds to cover a major club expense. Beth was receiving these messages while bouncing through airports on two hours sleep returning from Michigan. I think I was cruising in Canada at the time. About \$3,000 was transferred.

Beth thought that she had completed the transaction at the direction of the Commodore. When no one caught on, the thief decided to do it again. This time the transfer was for \$4,000.

New Cruise Chair: Star Class Dues Due: Salish 100: PHRF Dues Due



Everyone was just getting back from vacation. When Beth and I met to hand off some mail and Club paperwork, she was obviously upset at me. She was trying to find a polite way to inform the new Commodore that his requests for fund transfers were unprofessional and should probably have board approval. That was the moment that we became aware of the fraud. The thief had impersonated me so well that Beth thought she was showing me e-mail that I had written.

Beth went right to work with the bank and the police department.

She was able to reverse the second transaction and recover \$4,000. The police detective worked with Beth and attempted to set up a sting to lure the thief into the bank to sign for the transaction. When the thief didn't take the bait, it was obvious he was either out of the country or aware that we had discovered the theft. The first transaction could not be recovered. The thief was using a middleman who was probably not aware they were stealing money, and the account that received the funds was now empty.

Beth felt personally responsible for the loss and offered to replace the lost funds.

She was told no, but she sent us a check anyway to cover the \$3,000 loss. The board voted to refuse the reimbursement. It was the opinion of the board that the Club was the victim of this theft, not Beth. This was the first time I can recall that a board vote was not unanimous. Beth voted against the motion to refuse the funds.

The Board members have all expressed their full confidence in Beth. While she offered to tender her resignation, we deeply appreciate her work as Treasurer and hope she continues.

The Club is financially healthy. If you have any questions about this event, please feel free to speak with one of our board members.

RC Report

Come out and join us racing. You will have a wonderful time meeting new sailors and improving your boats performance by watching / learning from veteran racers.

The 20 n.m. Squaxin Island Race on 17 November was just such a race. *Transition*, the RC boat, gave us plenty of space when setting the start line, leaving no reason for bumper boats. The forecast was for dry with a light breeze and temperature in the 50s. The breeze picked up

at the start to low double digits the sun came out bright in a cloudless sky. Everyone started to peel off foulies.

There was a 11+ foot flood which gave us many options from the start. Skippers were put to work right away with calculating a route through the strong tide. Upon passing Brisco Point and heading north up Peale Passage we were blessed with a beautiful view of Mt.

Rainier. The wind fell off a few knots from the NE but many boats were able to make the entire length of Peale Passage without a tack.

That all changed at the north end of Squaxin Island in the narrows. The first boats in the narrows were soon joined by most of the fleet as the wind became just a few puffs. Break outs were taking place one boat at a time and into fresh air and building pressure. We had a beautiful beam reach from the north end of Squaxin past Hope Island all the way to the

finish line. First to finish had a time of 3 hours. and 7 minutes. while the cruising class, D Class, were crossing mostly in less than 5 hours.

A great way to start racing is first getting on board a race boat to crew. Winter sailing does not always mean nasty weather. Another option to learn how to race is buoy racing. SSSS offers 20 buoy races throughout the season. The courses are much shorter so your time commitment is somewhat less. Contact me if you are interested.

Southern Sound Series Rep Report: Series Off and Running

The first of the 2018-19 Southern Sound Series races kicked off December first with the Winter Vashon Island Race sponsored by Tacoma Yacht Club. SSSS was well represented with fourteen boats of the sixty-seven boats participating in the race. The Race kicked-off with a great Friday night dinner and a lot of pre-race blustering.

For the Race, the southern sound conditions lived up to its reputation! The day started as a bank of fog slowly rolled in from the east enveloping TYC as chilly crews readied their boats for the big day. As the boats headed out, the fog cleared to partly sunny skies and whispers of an easterly breeze. And whispers it was, you needed to be near the start line for your start or you gave a big lead to others in your class. That light easterly immediately gave rise to a collection of brightly colored

spinnakers with nearly all

boats heading out on a

starboard tack.

All those slow moving boats must have presented a real challenge for the Vashon Ferry as she head out from Tacoma. With the incoming tide, the normally north flowing current entering Clovos Passage was dampened and boats spread across the sound from Vashon Island to nearly the entrance to Gig Harbor. The view from Point Defiance must have been impressive with boats, big and small, scattered across the view. Unfortunately, the battle for wind had begun.

As the boats headed north it quickly became a game of juggling finding the wind puffs and/or the most favorable currents. Generally, the boats that stayed to the west side of the passage inched slowly ahead of those further east. Quite literally, it was a miles long string of spinnakers and wing on wing boats all seeking the best sailing conditions. Then the rain came.

As the rain rolled in the wind became even more spotty. Eventually, most of those spinnakers became big wet curtains as crews fought to keep them flying. Here and there you'd note a full chute only to see it sag after a few minutes. It became a war to keep the boat moving. SSSS racers are familiar with that battle! Slowly the fleets became mixed as the PHRF boats moved in amongst the earlier starting cruising Commodore and NFS fleets. In the light air it is amazing how sound travels over the water. It was not uncommon to hear the conversations on multiple boat as everyone slipped along.

By the mid afternoon, those boats in the lead managed to find their way to a shortened course finish off the north end of

Vashon Island as those in the rear began to considering withdrawing as the likelihood of finishing dimmed. The final results were a mixed bag with some of the favored front runners mixed in the all of us commoners. In the end, as at the start, and most importantly, there were still lots of smiles and a good time had by all.

Special note is given to Reese Cassal and the crew of *Redline* with a first in PHRF Class 5 and a second over-all for the race. He, his crew, and SSSS should be proud of their finish. Note should also be given to Dave Knowlton and the <u>nine</u> crew members of *Koosah* for their first place in the Cruising NFS Class. A full showing of the SSSS racers is provided below. Now on to the second race of the Series.

The Duwamish Head race will be sailed on January 5th, sponsored by Three Tree Point Yacht Club. The race proceeds from Des Moines, north into Elliott Bay, west and around Blakeley Rocks and back to Des Moines. For Olympia transit boats space is available at TYC for Friday and Saturday nights. Following a long

tradition, Dave Knowlton, *Koosah*, makes the reservation for all SSSS sailors for Friday night's meal at TYC.

Then Toliva Shoal is coming up on February 16th and is the SSSS/OYC's biggest sailing event. This is the longest race of the Series at 38 nm. and if history holds, we may have anything from sun and light winds to howling gales like last year's race.

Speaking of both this year's Winter Vashon and last year's Toliva Shoal Races, like all the bigger Puget Sound races, Jan

Anderson's pictures do a great job of capturing what these races are like. If you are curious to see what big fleet races look like, take a peek at https://janpix.smugmug.c om. Looking at those pictures are a great way to spend some time thinking about sailing on our long winter evenings.

Give some thought to joining us on the water for some of these races. The Notice of Race and Sailing Instructions are

available at www.ssssclub.com/ssseries. The Regatta Network will again be used for registration and scoring making it easy to sign-up using a credit card. Line up a crew and get ready for some great shared days on the South Sounds waters.

For SSSS races we give you a grace period until Toliva, but they will be checking at Duwamish. Current PHRF members were mailed a dues notice in November. If you have not yet returned it, do so now. If you have lost it, go to the PHRF web site.

If you are a racing skipper, race regularly, and are not a PHRF member, you should consider joining. We could not race without PHRF. Our non PHRF classes rely on their intellectual property: their methods and information that PHRF



developed and continues to refine. Being made up of racers, it requires the support of the racers. You can support PHRF and still race in a non PHRF class.

You may think of our Club as small, not really significant compared to the Seattle and Tacoma clubs. But we have been the second or third largest PHRF club; measured by the number of PHRF members in a club. SSSS, you, are more important to the the sport than you might think.

Salish 100 **Small Boat Cruise**

The Port Townsend Pocket Yachters' are hosting the Salish 100 Small-Boat Cruise from 22-28 June 2019. Pocket cruisers from all over, and I mean all over. will launch from Swantown Marina and will lillypad for 7 days to Port Townsend. There are no costs to participate, but moorage fees may apply. Interest in this event has been immense and prior registration is required. Registration info is at the bottom. Here is the basic scheme of maneuver:

DAY ONE Saturday, June 22 Olympia waterfront to Hope Island Marine State Park (#1), about 10 nautical miles.

DAY TWO Sunday, June 23 Hope Island to Penrose Point State Park (#2), about 16 nautical miles.

DAY THREE Monday, June 24 From Penrose, we're heading north through the Tacoma Narrows to Gig Harbor (#3), about 15 nautical miles.

DAY FOUR Tuesday, June 25 Gig Harbor to Blake Island Marine State Park (#4), about 16 nautical miles.

DAY FIVE Wednesday, June 26 Blake Island north up central Puget Sound past Bainbridge Island to the Port of Kingston marina (#5), about 14 nautical miles.

DAY SIX Thursday, June 27 Kingston to Mats Mats Bay (#6), about 16 nautical

FINAL DAY Friday, June 28 Mats Mats Bay to Port Townsend, about 13 nautical miles.

Depending on when boats make it to Port Townsend, they may have shuttle runs to Olympia. Another option is to have tow rigs and empty trailers driven to Port Townsend and parked downtown.

There are still several variables that need to be worked out. Once you sign up you will receive a detailed description of the event and updates when available.

They are also looking for skippers of larger boats to act as motherships along the route (carrying extra fuel, water, and towing assistance). I am coordinating with the Port Townsend Pocket Yachters POC to firm up any support that SSSS might be able to provide.




