October Meeting: *Duracell*, a Piece of American History

The October 11th Meeting will feature Matt Steverson and Janni Petersen who are working to restore *Duracell*, a racing boat that circumnavigated the world.

Matt and Janni quit their jobs in 2017 as a shipwright and middle school science teacher and set sail on their 39-foot sailboat for two years. The cruise took them from Seattle south to Baja, across the Pacific to French Polynesia, North to Hawaii, and back home. They are now settled in Port Townsend where they have begun a maritime adventure of a different kind: bringing back to life the legendary racing boat, *Duracell*, into a comfortable and fast cruiser. With a storied past and a 25 year pause on the hard in a backyard outside of Seattle, *Duracell's* story now continues with them.

Within just a week of returning from our cruise, Matt was surfing a local sailing forum when he came across a post with the title: Mike Plant's Open 60 *Duracell*, What Next? In the post, John, went on to say: "I love that boat. I can't imagine a more easily handled, sea-kindly, safe, proven, shorthanded boat capable of sailing anywhere on earth."

Matt saw this post and without a moment's hesitation he knew he had found their next boat and the boat that he knew was worth the considerable effort it would take to get it back on the water. He always knew he wanted a big boat project, but he never dreamed he would get *this particular boat*.

Duracell is not just any boat. It was designed by Rodger Martin and built by Mike Plant back in the 80's. After building it, Mike Plant sailed around the world on it twice, beating the American record, at 135 days, for circumnavigation of the planet during the first Vendee Globe. Mike Plant and *Duracell* are featured in the documentary, *Coyote: The Mike Plant Story*.

They are now one year in to giving this legendary race horse new life as a comfortable-and, yes, *fast* cruising home and are documenting every step of the project on their new YouTube channel: *The Duracell Project*.

Matt first discovered his love for sailing and boats when he was a student at The Evergreen College and spent many afternoons on Budd Inlet.

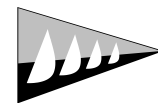

If you are not able to board your boat over the stern, you can still join the stern-tie and access the dock through a neighbor's boat, or take one of the linear side-tie spots. We will make room for everyone! We will monitor VHF Channel 68 for those who wish to contact us as they approach the dock.

Those who arrive Friday are invited to a happy hour on the dock that may include decorating the pavilion. Saturday afternoon activities will include boat decorating, a pumpkin carving contest, and several fun games. There will be a waffle breakfast

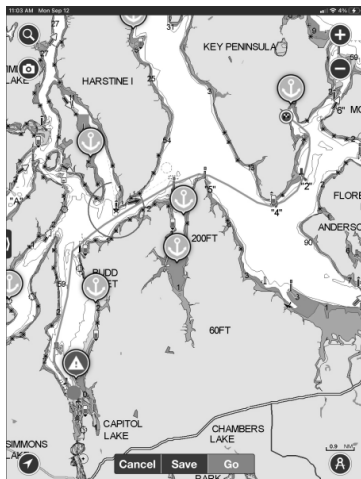

The evening flood current is light, so it should be an easy trip in any tide. There are several back eddies on the southwest shore of Dana Passage that can help you sneak out if the tide is flooding.

There will be a light ebb tide against us in Dana Passage for the trip home on Sunday afternoon, unless you wait for the flood tide around 17:00. Hold your course near the northwest shore along Harstine Island to avoid the current in Dana Passage.

RC Report

Late October begins our distance races. Races that make us feel we get somewhere without rounding a buoy every mile! Time to eat lunch and sip a hot cocoa. It's a very different game than round the buoy races.

After the Fall Series, our distance races begin with the Eagle Island Race. Review and inspect your boat's safety gear, required to participate in SSSS distance races, including the basic Coast Guard requirements. A VHF radio is one of the winter requirements. Review the Safety requirements on the SSSS website at

[Racing>PHRF>AboutPHRF>SSSS_SER.pdf](#) (the pdf link is half way down the page). Also note that "gear" includes good judgment under Requirement 1.2. In addition, see Requirement 4.2, and actually practice a person overboard drill, rescue a fender!

Remember to volunteer yourself or a crew member to assist Bill and Vicky on their committee boat *Transition*. They need at least one person for each race. The sooner you volunteer, the better chance of getting your preferred dates. Serving as, or on, the committee boat is a requirement at least once a year. See NOR 2.2 and Sailing Instructions 16.7.

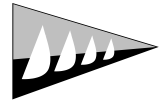

Jim, It's been fun getting out there with so many boats from around the world. The competition is intense. The wind shifts have been crazy. Race 1, I was on the wrong side of a 110 deg shift that sent many of us from golden to coal. Yesterday we had 8-18 gusting to 22 with 20 deg shifts.



Last night we had the Gala dinner and heard stories from 15 World champions including Malin Burnham who won it at 16 in 1946.

My crew is from Ukraine and 6'6". We are trying to figure out how he can go over the side to hike without hitting waves. The ideal Star crew it seems should be 230 lbs with a 29" inseam.

Estimated at 20-30 gusting to 35. 15 boats stayed ashore, 5 sailed in before the start, 2 masts broke before the start, another 3 after the start. We managed a good weather leg, rounding in the top 30. Downwind was a blast surfing, until we got hit with a super gust that rolled the boat to weather, buried the bow, broke the pole, but thankfully not the mast, and half filled the boat with water. The jib down haul also broke and our day was done. We jury rigged a downhaul and sailed the six miles upwind in a steady 25. My wife

Sue was on the photo boat and witnessed all the carnage. Her comment, "I wouldn't have believed it if I hadn't been there."

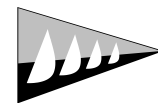

[If you raced every PHRF race you would make the Quarter Century, with three days to spare. Ed.]

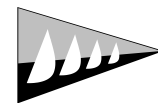

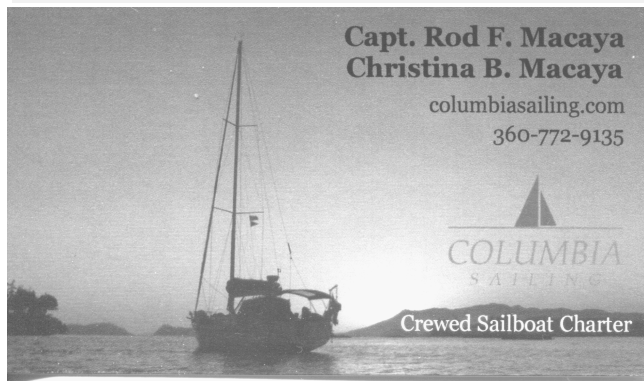

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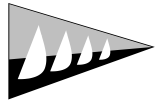
