# January Meeting: Racing with Carl Buchan

Join your sailing colleagues for the evening of January 9th with sailboat racing champion Carl Buchan, who will share his adventures racing this summer in a double-handed race around the Isle of Wright in England. The annual Round Isle of Wight Race (RIOW), which starts and finishes in Cowes, was the course for the first America's Cup. Carl will also share racing tips and other sailing adventures he has had during his half-century of sailing.

Carl got his inspiration from his father, Bill Buchan, a National Sailing Hall of Fame

Inductee. At the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games both father and son won Gold Medals in sailing in different classes. In 1984, Carl won the US Singlehanded Championship for the O'Day Trophy as a 17-year-old and one year later won the World Single-handed Youth Championship. Buchan was named College Sailor of the Year in 1977. Buchan is a tall, slender sailor and well suited for the Laser Class. He won the US Nationals three times (1978, 1980, 2000) and the North American Championship in 1992. In

addition, Carl and his wife, Carol, won the Tasar World Championship in 2001.

#### Southern Sound Series

Winter Vashon Report, Duwamish Head Next Up!

Winter Vashon, the First Race of the 203-24 Southern Sound Series, is in the books with 66 registered boats and about everything you can expect from NW winter sailing!

Early forecasts for race day jumped back and forth from rain and plenty of wind to possible freezing temperatures with rain and little wind and back again. Forecasts for the transit to Tacoma Yacht Club for SSSS racers painted the same picture. We SSSS racers plan our transits north based on both Tacoma Narrow's currents and weather forecasts, with Jolly Rumbalow and Folie 'a Deux picking a Thursday transit for better weather but earlier tides and others making the move on Friday with better currents but more forecast rain and wind. Surprise, surprise, the forecasts were off. The Thursday transits began with clouds and flat water but devolved to rain and a windy finish, a typical NW slog! The Friday transits did have a strong southerly wind but no rain and even sunshine! So much for trying to read forecasts for transits needed for TYC's Winter Vashon, TTPYC's Duwamish Head, and GHYC's Islands Race!

Similarly, forecasts for race day bounced all over including gale warnings. All racers we pleasantly surprise to see sunny skies and a strong southerly wind after a very windy and rainy Friday night.

The PHRF and Non-PHRF cruising classes set off after a briefly delayed start with and assortment of reefed and unreefed mains, various foresails, but no spinnakers with the gusty winds. The cruising boats were well on their way in to Colvos Passage before PHRF class starts.

The early PHRF classes also hesitated to pop their chutes uncertain of what the winds would be like once past the shelter of Point Defiance. In clearer air, the colors of spinnakers bloomed all over Colvos Passage with steady winds of 15 to 20 knots. On *Folie*, theoretical hull speed of 7.1 knots, we often saw speeds in the upper 8 knots, making for some white-knuckle sailing. So white knuckled that *Folie* had her first semi broach in a 25+gust, but thanks to a great crew the recovery was quick.

Even without spinnakers, the non-flying sails cruisers were making big time toward the north end of Vashon Island as the faster PHRF fleets raced to catch them. With the southwesterly winds the passage north made for a long port reach.

Approaching the turn mark north of

Vashon, we were pleased to see the redhulled Jolly Rumbalow, captained by Richard Bigley, in the first few boats to round the mark and head south with full sails. Except for those early boats to the mark, most of the fleet found the wind dying as they approached the mark. After not a single gybe all the way north we rounded the mark and found that the chute continued on the same tack, a preview of the games to be played. The wind, what there was of it, played Ring Around the Rosie, in the noon time sun. Boats were headed in every compass point, some on port, some on starboard, and most with sagging sails.

Finally the wind began to fill in and the compressed fleet again headed south with now filling full mains and big foresails. Quickly the winds returned to full force as the fleet moved south and reefs and sail changes to smaller foresails appeared. Boats were scattered from Three Tree point to Browns Point, some very much

over powered. The final boats back to the TYC start/finish line finished in the last of daylight. It was truly a great day to be sailing!

Next up in the Southern Sound Series, and bringing in the New Year, is Three Tree Point Yacht Club's **Duwamish Head** 

Race on January 6<sup>th</sup>. If you just received this S-t-S it's not too late, if you hurry.

The race starts off the Des Moines marina pier, heads north into Elliott Bay, around the Duwamish head dolphin, across the Sound to Blakely Rocks and back to the finish line at Des Moines, 30.8 nm. If needed, the race can be shortened at the Duwamish Head dolphin or the north side of Blakely Rocks. Like Winter Vashon this race requires a pre-race transit from Olympia to TYC (guest dock is available), Gig Harbor, or possibly on to Des Moines marina. For those racing in the PHRF fleets, remember, you need to have your PHRF membership up to date. The non PHRF cruising classes race boat for boat and do not need to have a PHRF membership or rating. This race often has the most racers of the Series and often the best winds.

The Series has started off with a great race with more to come. Gather up a crew and come join in on the race.

MELGES: The Wizard of Zenda is a documentary about one of the greatest sailors you've never heard of. With unlimited access to behind-the-scenes archival footage, this sports biography

captures the untold story of Buddy Melges, a tenacious competitor with a fiery attitude and the winning record to back it up.

You'll hear from fellow world class sailors and competitors, like America's Cup champion and

former ESPN sailing analyst Gary Jobson; three-time champion Dennis Conner, the sailor they call 'Mr. America's Cup'; John Bertrand, the Australian skipper who shocked the world by breaking the 132 year U.S. winning streak; and Bill Koch, the billionaire yachtsman who partnered with Buddy to chase the cup in 1992.

This feature length documentary takes you beyond the headlines to explore Buddy's extraordinary life. With interviews, archival film footage and video gathered across five decades, you'll learn about a sailor from a working-class family in southern Wisconsin who built a resume of winning that made him one of the greatest sailors of all time.

Discover the driving force behind Buddy's continuous quest to challenge himself by moving from class to class to test himself against the greatest sailors in the world. Competitors and historians explain how Buddy sailed not like an engineer, but as an artist. His sailing was less about science — more about artistic expression.

Whether art or science, Buddy was a fierce competitor who shared what he learned with anyone willing to take the time to ask. His legendary career seems almost mystical, and earned him the well-deserved nickname: The Wizard of Zenda.

Can you close your eyes and return to a favorite sailing trip? One that was so inspiring that you feel like you are back there? I had a trip like that in early December.

It started out without much fanfare. An easy start out of the slip, sails went up quickly and smoothly, a little cool, then right into the channel. The Wave Walker was doing the job she was designed to do. She came smoothly out of Fiddlehead into that channel like she always does. Then just past West Bay Marina, 10 minutes out, this trip became a memorable one for me.

> I saw a spout spewing vertically from the surface of the water. I just had to see what it was. As I approached, I saw the source of the water spout, a gray whale, 25 to 30 feet long, complete with barnacles! That whale performed its magic for about the next hour, rolling up to show its back, spewing a fountain of

water, then plunging back into the depths of the Sound. While the whale had his breakfast, I drank in the beauty of it all. Both of us continued until we were satiated.

The whale was gone as quickly as it had come. I returned to the crisp cold wind of a sailing trip I will remember for years.

The trip that day was short in time, not more than three hours, but the memories will last a long time, maybe forever. When I am not able to go out on the water for one reason or another, I close my eyes and live this one over again.


