March Meeting: Nancy Erley

Nancy Erley, Captain of two world circumnavigations, will be our featured speaker at the March Meeting. Nancy will address Advanced Anchoring. After a short refresher on anchoring basics the presentation will focus on strategies for tricky situations, crowded anchorages and severe weather including using multiple anchors and ways to get a fouled anchor unstuck. Nancy anchored over a thousand times in her two circumnavigations and speaks from a wealth of personal mishap and recovery.

Nancy Erley loves boats, and it has been said that if you stand next to her, and listen to her stories long enough, you will start to love boats too. Tethys, Nancy's beloved Orca 38 served as an ocean sailing classroom for 65 different women crew on two 5 year voyages from Seattle around the world. "As the skipper of an all-woman crew, Nancy fashioned a circumnavigation that should go down in the record books as one of the soundest, most seamanlike

journeys in the modern cruising era. Like all competent voyages, *Tethys* circumnavigation was notable for its lack of disasters." George Day, publisher *Blue Water Sailing*.

In 2006 Nancy was presented with the Leadership in Women's Sailing Award sponsored by BoatUS and the National Women's Sailing Association. The award honors a male or female who has built a record of achievement in inspiring, educating and enriching the lives of women through sailing.

Nancy holds her USCG 100-ton Master of Ocean license, is an Instructor Evaluator-Ocean for the International Sail and Power Association, a HAM radio operator KI7DP, and an advanced scuba diver, and delivery skipper. Southern Sound Series Rep Toliva Shoal Race

The third race of the 2018-19 Southern Sound Series, SSSS/OYC's very own Toliva Shoal Race, is now in the record book. As the race week approached, Puget Sound was buried under more snow than we've had in years. Like many racers, I viewed the snow as a potential issue for *Folie* and on Sunday headed to Swantown to clean her up after Friday and Saturday's snow. It was an obvious concern as I was not alone with several fellow SSSS'ers stopping into the marina to check



or de-snow their boats. Ultimately it was for not, as the bigger snow dump followed Sunday night and most of Monday.

The weather was a real concern as the Toliva Committee discussed the race. As of Tuesday, only 17 boats had registered for the race and serious consideration was given to simply cancelling the Race with many northern racers apparently questioning the transit south for the Race. Fortunately as the week progressed the weather forecast improved and in the end 33 boats had registered for the Race.

One casualty of the snow and low sign-up was Thera and crew's remarkable Friday night, prerace roast beef feast. With the uncertainly, it was simply too risky buying lots of food for an uncertain crowd. In its place, Thera, Susie, Tom and all the Toliva crew had welcoming beer and pizza waiting Friday night as the crews of boats adventuring south and local SSSS racers. We should mention that Suzie is now officially retired from her Toliva duties. We appreciate her many years of commitment to making that dinner the best ever!

Race day forecasts were for light winds at the start and slowly building through the day with

only a chance of showers. That forecast was spot on! After the last two drifting races everyone was relieved to see wind ripples on the water as they headed out to the start area. The sun popped out as the 10 boats in the Commodore and Cruising classes headed north toward Boston Harbor. The other starts were less congested than most Southern Sound Series races with a continuous stream of spinnakers dotting Budd Inlet. Things got a little light in Dana Passage but, true to the forecast, the wind did refill and continued to build as boats rounded Johnson Point. Looking at the spreading of the boats, what I consider our

professional PRO announced that the race would be ended at Toliva Shoal.

With thickening clouds, following the only upwind leg to the Nisqually mark, the fleets once again headed north with most again popping their chutes. For over two hours finishers passed between the OYC mark boat and the Toliva Buoy. With the ebbing tide, boats from up north simply continued north after finishing. Some of those heading back to

Olympia chose to simply continue on the race course as the wind now provided enough power to move the boats as quickly as the iron sail. 

PHRF-NW Handicappers Annual Meeting

Sunday January 27th the PHRF-NW handicappers gathered at Shilshole CYC clubhouse for our annual get-together. We had more member observers than we've been seeing so that was nice to see some member involvement. Like most meetings there was a lot of talking in tangential circles. I'm afraid for the folks who attended the process wasn't clear at times, but there were a few decisions made on some handicapping issues on the agenda.

A lot of time was spent on the topic of



Last month we looked at tacking too close. This month let's look at tacking inside the three boat length zone at a mark Everything we talked about last month still applies. Rule 18.3, Tacking in the Zone, adds obligations on the tacking boat.

Rule 18.3, Tacking in the Zone, applies if all of the following are true:

1. The mark is a windward mark to be left to port; it does not apply if rounding to starboard.



sportboats, how to define them, PHRF-NW's role in rating them versus more conventional craft. The decision was made to have a committee work on developing some criteria that can be incorporated into the PHRF-NW rating codes that will give race management some simple indicators to aid them in creating classes of like boats.

Other than that, there were three handicap appeals presented, one for a particular Aphrodite 101, one for *Uno* and *Dos*, the Sierra 26s, and one for the Melges 24. The Aphrodite handicap was unresolved and delegated to former chief handicapper Alan Grim to sort out. The Sierras had their handicaps reduced 6 seconds a mile with the acquiescence of their owner. The Melges 24 handicap engendered much discussion. The appeal was brought by the Victoria handicapper who owned a Melges and has a number of them in his area where there is consensus the rating should be lower. He proposed as low as 84. On a 6-5 vote the handicap was lowered to 90. Sorry, Tucker.

- 2. And, one boat tacks onto starboard in the zone and can then fetch the mark; it does not apply when tacking to port or below the layline.
- 3. And, the other boat was on starboard when she entered the zone; it does not apply if both boats tacked in the zone.

When 18.3 applies the tacking boat must give the other more room. After completing her tack cleanly, one would normally have rights. In the zone however your tack can not force the other boat above closehauled even after you have rights.

Note that if the other boat is over standing, as many of our racers often are, they can be forced to weather of the tacking boat without going above closehauled.

If the other boat chooses to go below the tacking boat and becomes over-lapped inside, rule 18.3 requires the tacker to give her mark room (the restriction on establishing an overlap in the zone in rule 18.2 is voided by rule 18.3).



Sailing Education Program

We are just beginning our spring sailing season with middle and high school students taking the helm again next this month. You will begin seeing our sailors on the docks and out on the water again soon as the snow melts.!

US Sailing National Championships will be taking place this spring at Sail Sand

Point in Seattle. We hope to see some people there to cheer our teams on. We will let you all know when the regatta is and hope to have some carpooling happening to show support for the sailors.

Boat Naming Our boat naming ceremony will take place this spring as soon as our boats arrive from the Zim boat builders back on the east coast. We have 5 of our new boats named and one still up for grabs. If you would like to name a boat and see it

out on the water almost everyday from March through November, this is your chance. The cost is \$1,000 and it will be placed on a brand new Flying Junior (FJ) soon gracing our waters.

We have some projects that we could use help with. Some take a few hours, some that take a day, some that will be a little more involved. Here are a few examples:

Hauling boats on trailers: if you have a pick-up truck, we will need to haul several of our boats on trailers to Tom's Outboard and to a shop for fiberglass repair and bottom paint or annual maintenance before the summer schedule begins. Because high school and middle school sailing starts up soon, we have to time these so that we always have to serviceable chase boats available. That means we will be hauling boats to and from several times. So if you are retired, and have a truck with trailer hitch and lights, we can use your help.

Sewing: If you are a good at sewing, even if you haven't experience with

canvas,we could use your help to create boat covers for our chase boats. We will buy the fabric and notions. Covers will help cut down on UV damage to painted surfaces and keep the rain water out during the winter months. So we don't have to bail as often. Let us know if you are willing to help out as a helper or if you have canvas experience, as the lead on one, or several, covers needed for our chase boats. We have sewing machines for heavy

material available.

Bottom Paint We have one boat that needs bottom paint. Taping and painting shouldn't take long. We did the last one in a two overnight stay at the shop and finished the paint in one morning. We supply all the materials except your coveralls. The shop we work in is on Johnson Pt Road so the boat has to be hauled there and work done when it is convenient for shop owner Bill Brosious.

Boat House/Classroom Clean up After 400 summer students and fall and spring high school sailing students go through our boathouse for classes etc, the building starts looking a little used. We would like to have a one day clean up which will entail moving benches out, cleaning floor, painting if needed, and organizing shelves and workbench. Dates will be set, an email blast will be sent and then volunteers just need to show up.


