Race Chair's Report

At the March Meeting, we put on our Sailboat Skills clinic which included an Introduction to Sailboat Racing. This was intended to inform anyone interested in

somewhat informal approach to racing, places the emphasis on having fun. If your new to racing, I recommend you not be overly concerned with the results or where you end up in the standings. Look at racing as a way to improve your boat handling abilities, your overall knowledge of the sport, and to gain experience with time spent on the water.

April 26th. We are planning to offer prerace practice sessions for boat owners who want to start PHRF racing. On any

These are: 1.) downloading and reading our 2024-2025 Sailing Instructions; 2.) learn the starting sequence, which is explained in the sailing instructions; 3.) have the required safety gear, as per the list found on our web site; 4.) if you want to be scored, contact our PHRF handicapper, Rafe Beswick, to get a handicap; and 5.) monitor VHF channel 72.

There is a well written section on our web site that describes in more detail these minimum requirements to race. Navigate to More about SSSS PHRF Racing from the PHRF racing page.

The purpose of racing is to have fun and develop sailing skills. My dad used to tell me that those who race, learn to sail their boats better, even if their main interest is cruising. Our Club's friendly, and

Islands Race a Full-on Series Wrap Up

The Southern Sound Series wrapped up in pretty much the same way she started. December's Winter Vashon came in like a lion, provided an "exciting" race and the Islands Race similarly went out like a

tiger! With forecasts of SW winds ranging upward from 10 knots to gusts in the low 30s and "showers" the racers headed to the starting area. Even before the start many reefed mains could be seen along with blades or heavy "3s" on forestays.

The cruising class got the first start at 09:30 and quickly headed north with a gusty southeasterly wind, not a spinnaker to be seen. By the start of the first PHRF classes, the cruisers were well on their way north on the new Islands

Race Course. With Corinthian Yacht Club Tacoma now sponsoring the race, a new course has been set for the Race. From Browns Pont the course basically heads north up the eastern side of main channel east of Vashon Island leaving all traffic separation buoys to port. One tricky spot includes also leaving a permanent CYCT buoy, just south of Three Tree point to port as well. More on this to come! After working north to a turn mark north of Blake Island the return is down the west side of the channel again leaving all traffic separation buoys to port. The course is a great tour of the Tacoma to Seattle waterwav!

With the start of the PHRF fleets, some spinnakers did bloom across the sound, many judging it best to also keep that foresail up as well. Then the fun started! From Folie traveling over 8 knots, with a more conservative single reefed main and #3, we watched as the spinnaker boats did take off, some under control, some in a constant fight, and some rounding up repeatedly. The fun really started as the boats began to converge on the CYCT buoy at Three Tree Point. That buoy is not that far south of the rock jetty at the point. With semi controlled spinnaker boats on both sides, we had to watch out for sudden spinnaker round ups or broaches from either side.

We were glad to round the mark in the clear and watched as spinnaker boats battled with the now SW winds more on the beam. Some quickly opted to stow those chutes with a couple very colorfully "shrimping" in the process. A few seemed to bounce back and forth between control and wild round ups. Some also handled the

quick turns very well. Our own *Bodacious* was an example of the later. It was amazing to watch an Antrim 27 planning along rock solid, at least 15 knots, roster tail flying behind. While downwind sailing in calmer conditions can be quite relaxing, shifty winds in the 20s with much

higher gusts can make for some attention focused, white knuckled sailing!

Once round the Blake Island mark the beat back south began. A starboard tack was the definite favored tack with long

good VMG runs before having to tack back west. For some this was a bit of a trap. If that starboard tack was held too long, it was a tough 0 VMG port tack to get back to the port rounding of the traffic buoy off Point Robinson.

Intermixed with all the winds and waves were the squalls! While there was mostly sun at the start, clouds filled in but stayed dry on the northward leg. Then things got ominous. You could see them coming, those dark gray veils from cloud to ground that you cannot see through. As they approached the winds would pick up quickly, often varying angles 20+ degrees. Along with the wind came the rain or at times stinging sleet, all the while breaking through waves dousing those on the rail all the way back to the helm. While only occasionally glancing at our anemometer, I was kind of busy, I only saw a peak gust of 28 knots, but Tacoma Airport recorded a

> gust of 44 which is probably more accurate. Oh, sailing in full conditions!

They like to say sailing the Swiftsure is "always an adventure", the same can be said of the Southern Sound Series. Over the four month Series this year we had times of sun, rain, squalls, and wind from 0 to the 44. This year every race wrapped up before dark, which says a lot about both the good sailing conditions

and the wise decisions of the various sponsoring clubs' race committees. A special THANKS to our very own race committee, *Transition*, and all the SSS/OYC volunteers, and SSS/OYC racers that made this year's Series a success! Hope to see you all out there next year! Winter Vashon is coming up December 6th!

Jo Emma Beach, April 12-13

April will find cruisers returning to an old favorite at Jo Emma Beach State Park, on the East shore of Case Inlet just a bit south of McMicken Island. The Park has a floating dock and jetty along with a few mooring buoys, no power or water at the dock, but there is water on site. Anchorage is possible as well, although in unsettled weather, you may want to move overnight to the protection of McMicken Island. This has historically been a great spot to fish and crab, but unless the crab season miraculously opens, you may have to content yourself with watching them scuttle busily below the jetty, blissfully ignorant of their ancestors' fates.

We have rented the covered picnic shelter that includes five picnic tables and a couple of barbecues, so bring along the briquettes to grill your meat of choice to go with the potluck offerings. Happy hour will start sometime around 16:30, with the potluck to follow. There is plenty of parking for land cruisers as well, and it's an easy drive from Olympia. Come and join us, stroll the lovely sandy beach and watch the sun set behind Hartstine Island!

LifeSling Clinic June 7 at Olympia Center

One of the biggest risks and scariest events on a sailboat is a person falling overboard. The challenge of successfully rescuing the person in our cold water is even worse if your crew is shorthanded. Using the LifeSling and hoisting tackle, in conjunction with the sailboat's rigging, is a time tested and proven method of getting an overboard victim back to and onto the boat. However, to be sure you are using it properly it is best to get some instructions.

South Sound Sailing Society provides instructions with our annual Lifesling Clinic. This year it will be held June 7, starting with classroom instruction at 0900 in Room 200 at the Olympia Center at 222 Columbia Street NW. This is a fun and challenging way to learn or refresh your skills on how to use the LifeSling.

After the classroom instruction we will do dockside drills on the boats at Percival Landing. Once the dockside drills are finished, we will go out on Budd Inlet to do actual rescues with volunteer victims in survival suits. Each participant will complete a rescue while in sole control of the boat, although under the watchful eye of an instructor.

This is an opportunity to build confidence in your ability to rescue an overboard victim. You will be able to observe what other participants do right and how to overcome common mistakes. If you have taken the class before, please consider taking it again to refresh your skills.

The cost is just \$15 per person. It is especially helpful to learn how to use the LifeSling and hoisting tackle on the boat you sail. If you have a boat, please bring it and your crew. The fee will be waived for skippers who bring two or more crew members.

You will need to bring your life jacket, lunch, basic sailing skills and all your questions. Depending on wind conditions, we usually finish in mid-afternoon.

Registration is first come, first served. Space is limited so advance registration is encouraged. Please sign up by calling or texting me at (253) 732-2129 or by email at hsaller214@aol.com. I will be happy to answer any questions you have about the class.

Please also contact me if you would like to volunteer to be a victim for the on-the-water rescues. We will provide a (mostly) dry survival suit, along with much praise and gratitude for your contribution to this worthwhile effort.
